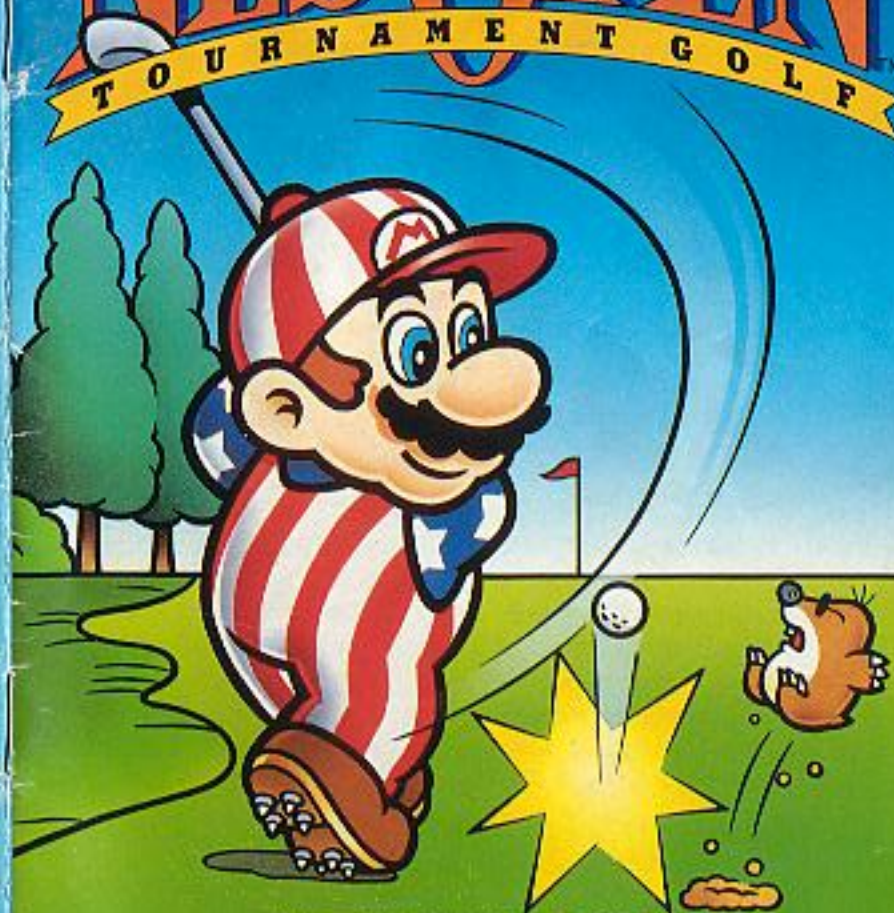

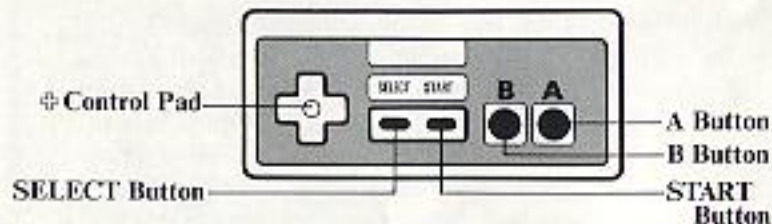

CONTROLLER FUNCTIONS AND SAVING THE GAME

For the 1 player game use controller 1
For the 2 player game use controllers 1 and 2

- Up, Down Change Selection / Hit Ball High or Low
- A Button Accept / Hit Ball
- B Button Cancel / Go Back One Screen / Show Lie
- START Button Interrupt Play
- SELECT Button Options

SAVING THE GAME

Pressing the Start Button during the game will save the game data.
Note: If you quit a tournament without saving the game, you will be scratched from the tournament and \$1,000 will be deducted from your winnings.
CAUTION: TO AVOID DAMAGING SAVED INFO, HOLD THE RESET BUTTON AS YOU TURN THE POWER OFF.



SELECTING THE GAME MODE

Make your game selection by pressing the top or bottom of the Control Pad followed by the A Button.



STROKE PLAY

This game's winner is decided by your total stroke count for 18 holes. Two players can play when player 1 uses controller 1 and player 2 uses controller 2.

MATCH PLAY

This game is decided by who wins or loses at each hole. The player who wins the most holes wins the game.

Playing Alone

Your opponents are the computer players when you play alone. This game has five opponents of varying levels, so select the opponent you want to play before starting the game.

Here are the five computer players:

The 1st Opponent: Luigi
Level - Beginner 1

Two Players

Player 1 using controller 1 competes against player 2 using controller 2. Either player may "give up" during the game by pressing the Select Button and then the A Button. The player who gives up will forfeit that hole to the other player.

TOURNAMENT

There is a stroke play tournament and a match play tournament. You may also select between 18 or 36 hole tournaments and three different courses—one in the US, one in Japan, and one in the UK.

Stroke Play Tournament

36 computer opponents and you will compete for the best stroke count for the course. If your player ranking goes up, the prize money will also go up. 36 hole tournaments also have higher prize money than 18 hole tournaments.

Match Play Tournament

This game has five computer opponents who challenge you one by one, each progressively more difficult to beat. If you keep winning against these opponents, your prize money increases. Note: If nobody has won by the final hole of the match play tournament, a sudden death play off will start from the first hole.

Bet On 1 Hole

You can compete with the CPU player whose rank is the same as yours to win prize money on every hole, however, there is also the possibility of LOSING money if you lose a hole. If you lose, the amount of the bet will be deducted from your total prize money. If you keep winning, the amount of the bet will increase.

CONTINUE

This will allow you to continue a paused or interrupted game.

VIEWING AND OPERATING ON THE PLAY SCREEN

2-D SCREEN

This screen shows important factors to be decided such as the direction the player is facing, the club to be used, swing speed, and ball spin.

- Complete map of the course
- The dark green areas are out-of-bounds

Remaining Distance and Carry

This shows the remaining "straight line" distance from the player's position to the hole.
This shows how far the ball carried after being hit.



1 Swing Speeds



Slow: Use this to keep the swing speed slow for a more controlled shot.

Med: Use this to make a standard swing.

Fast: Use this to hit the ball fast and make it carry further.

2 Club Choice



Select the club you want to use.

3 Top Spin and Back Spin



• Hit the ball at the top to apply top spin. When the ball lands it will roll further.

• Hit the ball at the bottom to apply back spin. When the ball lands it will stop quickly and/or roll backwards.



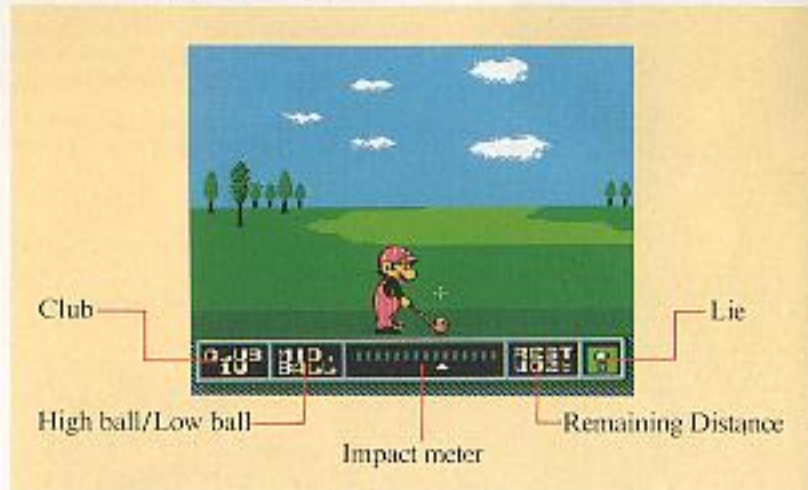
Select from one of the options in the three swing factors (swing speed, club to be used and the part of the ball to be struck) by pressing the top or bottom of the \rightarrow Control Pad, followed by the A Button.

Press the B Button to back up by one swing factor. (The lie of the ball will be displayed if the B Button is pressed, and the mode for determining swing speed is on screen.)

Press the left and right sides of the \rightarrow Control Pad to decide the direction the player is to face while hitting.

3-D SHOT SCREEN


This is the screen for carrying out shots.

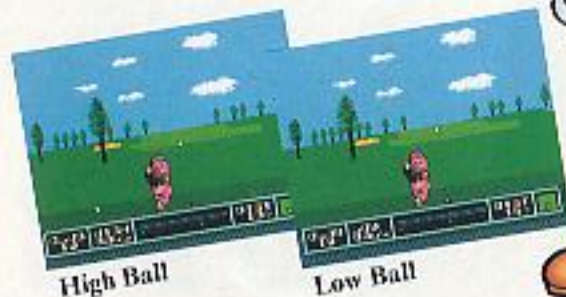


This screen is where you play your shots.

■ Hit a high ball or low ball

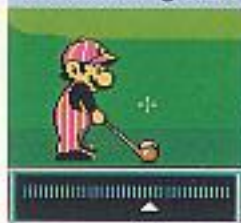


Press the  Control Pad to decide the flight of the ball. Don't press the control pad and the ball will be hit normally.



■ Taking a Shot

1. Back swing start



The first press of the A Button starts the shot; the player begins the back swing.

2. Top Position



The second press of the A Button decides the top position, which determines how hard the ball is hit.

3. Impact

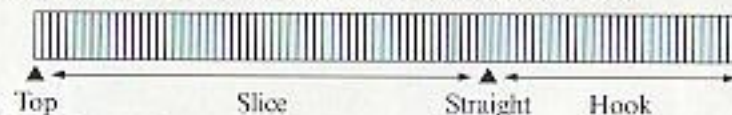


The third press of the A Button decides the impact, or whether the shot is a slice, straight, or hook shot.

Note: It is possible to make fine adjustments in the direction on the 3-D screen.

■ Slicing and Hooking the Ball

Depending on the impact position determined by the impact meter, the ball can be hit so that it curves right (slice shot) or left (hook shot).



- Swing Speed Slow makes the distance about 10% shorter than Medium Speed.
- Swing Speed Fast makes the distance about 10% longer than Medium Speed.



SUPER SHOT



You can make a SUPER SHOT by using a 1W. To make a Super Shot, the swing should stop farthest left and impact in the center of the impact bar.

There are seven kinds of lie for the ball.

Keep in mind that it is very difficult to judge the distance when you shoot from the rough or sand. It might be shorter or longer than you think. When you shoot a ball buried in a sand bunker you cannot hit a long distance. The distance given for each club reflects the distance the ball will travel including how far it will roll on the ground. Therefore, if the ball falls in the rough or in sand it will not roll as far and the total distance will be shorter than the indicated distance for that club.

2-D GREEN SCREEN

This is the Screen where you do your putting. You can change the swing speed if you want to.



- The >> symbols represent the coarseness and lie of the grass.
- The bigger the >> symbols are, the bigger the effect on your putt.

Types of Green



Has a weak effect on putt

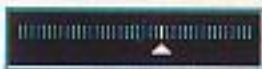


Has a strong effect on putt

Putting



Press the top and bottom of the D Control Pad to decide the putting speed.



Press the A Button to make Mario start the back swing. The triangular indicator will begin to move.



Press the A Button again to select the top position to determine the distance the ball will roll.

Press the A Button twice to putt. The ball will roll in the direction of the + symbol, so be sure to make the correct adjustments to the ball's direction before putting. A putt that is made with only one press of the A Button will go all the way to the left, return to the right, and then barely tap the ball with the putter—very handy for those real short putts.

Green

You can check the status of the green during play.



Lie

You can check the condition of the ground where the ball lies.



Course

On long holes you can look at the entire layout of the hole by scrolling up or down with the D Control Pad.

Replay

You can watch a replay of the shot you've just taken. Both players' last shot can be replayed on the two-player game. Note, however, that the computer player's shots cannot be replayed.

Give Up

This can be used during match play. The player that gives up loses the game.

TOURNAMENT PRIZE MONEY

1. Prize money will differ according to your rank.
2. Longest Drive Contest

If you make the longest tee shot among all the players on a specified hole you'll win the Longest Drive Contest, which means winning extra prize money, too. But remember... you can only win if your drive is on the fairway!



3. Closest To The Pin Contest

In this contest you and your opponents make tee shots on a specified hole; if your tee shot is closest to the pin, you win the contest and receive prize money.



4. Hole-In-One

You'll receive prize money if you make a hole-in-one.

5. Contest Prize Money is received from one of three flags. Press the left and right sides of the D Control Pad followed by the A Button to select the flag you want. The prize money for each flag will be different.

PLAYER RANK

Each player's rank is decided by stroke play results. Your rank will improve when the average scores of the two most recent stroke play contests are according to the below list.

You can only improve by one rank at a time and your rank cannot be downgraded. The player's current rank symbol will be displayed on the title screen's notice board.

CLUBHOUSE

This is where you register your name for a tournament, review your player data, deposit prize money at the Course Bank, and select your clubs.

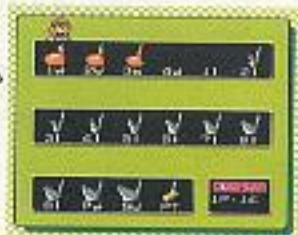
You can register only one player's name.

- ▶ Press the A Button to select the clubs you will use. Press the A Button again to cancel your selection.
- ▶ A total of 14 clubs may be carried. The putter cannot be cancelled.
- ▶ You can select each set of clubs separately for Player 1 and Player 2.

Options

You can set the following options

The one that is flashing red will be selected. Press the left and right sides of the \leftarrow Control Pad followed by the A Button.

You can choose the previously selected option by using the B Button.

Place the cursor over the Decided Button, then press the A Button.

- This setting also works in the two-player mode.



Choose whether or not you want to hear background music.



Choose the DEFAULT position for swing speed. If you choose OFF the previous setting will be saved to memory.



Choose the DEFAULT position for putt swing speed. If you choose OFF the previous setting will be saved to memory.



Choose the DEFAULT position for the type of spin you want to give the ball. If you choose OFF the previous setting will be saved to memory.

Player Stats

The results of your play are saved as Player Stats.

Note: Only Mario's results are saved, but none of the results in the 2-Player mode are saved. Also, game play in the MATCH PLAY modes will not be reflected in the player stats if the match ends after 18 holes with a tie.

- ▶ Play stats for stroke play (1 Player Game Only)
- ▶ Play stats for match play (VS Computer Opponent Only)
- ▶ Play stats for stroke play tournament
- ▶ Play stats for match play tournament



HOW NES OPEN GOLF RULES DIFFER FROM REAL GOLF

1. Out of Bounds (OB)

When the ball goes off the screen or into the Dark Green areas, it is out of bounds. Two strokes will be added to your score and the ball will be returned to the spot from which it was hit.

2. Water Hazard

When the ball lands in the water, one stroke will be added to your score and the ball moved to a suitable point on land. But watch out... sometimes the ball will hit water and skip to the land without a penalty.

3. Stroke Limit

You are limited to 50 strokes for one hole. Even if you exceed 50 strokes the number of strokes will not increase.

Note: There are other rules that differ slightly from real golf.



OTHERS

In the case of short holes, the distance to the hole is measured from the tee to the center of the green. Since REST is the distance from the player to the cup, these two measurements could sometimes differ.

HINTS FOR BETTER GOLFING



- Be persistent and practice frequently. Soon you'll be making money just like the pros!
- Use the wind to your advantage. It does NOT have to be to your back to be an advantage.
- Select your clubs carefully. As you become more experienced you'll find that some clubs are being used less than others or not at all. Try different clubs and experiment.
- Make note of the holes on which you have problems, then practice them in the Practice Mode.
